

# **ENGAGING** CRITICALLY

Librarians and library staff throughout the **Learning, Research, and Engagement Division** focus on our diverse community's information literacy and research needs. This includes creating dynamic learning experiences that promote critical thinking and encourage students to ask questions and identify limitations in the information they encounter.

Here are some examples of the division's work.

- The Teaching and Learning Team engages students from their first moments on campus, meeting with hundreds of new Patriots, especially transfer and international students, during orientation.
- **SmartStart** engages first-year, returning, and transfer students who may lack previous library orientation experience. The outreach, conducted across the libraries at all three campuses, reduces anxiety by introducing students to valuable resources, services, and library personnel.
- Librarian teams in Arts and Humanities, Social Sciences, and Science & Technology
  offer discipline-specific library instruction, research support, and programming for the
  George Mason academic community.

Through course-based instruction, on-demand workshops, and campus and community outreach, the Learning, Research, and Engagement Division empowers students to succeed.

- The Graduate Student Research Fellowship—funding that offsets research costs related to writing a dissertation or thesis.


Growing the endowment will allow us to provide additional awards to acknowledge, honor, and support exceptional research.

# **DEVELOPING SKILLS**

The University Libraries Student Assistant Program offers George Mason undergraduate and graduate students the opportunity to work directly with library staff on a variety of projects across the library system. Students develop excellent research, teaching, and customer relations skills as they gain in-depth experience using current academic research resources and information technologies.

Student assistant duties include:

- **Developing** and maintaining library research guides
- Providing basic library orientations and introductory library instruction
- **Supporting** librarians on research projects
- Assisting in technology-based projects

These positions include compensation, a much-needed benefit for the students that George Mason serves.

# **ENHANCING** OPPORTUNITY




# **MAINTAINING TREASURES**

The Appalachian Trail is a national treasure. The longest hiking-only footpath in the world, it measures roughly 2,190 miles in length and travels through 14 states along the crests and valleys of the Appalachian Mountain Range, from Maine to Georgia. More than three million people hike the trail every year.

The century-old history of this national treasure became the largest collection in the **University Libraries Special Collections Research Center (SCRC)** when the Appalachian Trail Conservancy Archives were relocated to George Mason in 2022. Under the SCRC's expert guidance, the collection will be professionally cataloged, preserved, and made widely available to the public.

The historical value of this collection is exceptional, as is the archival challenge it presents. It is a large collection consisting of more than 850 linear feet of unprocessed materials. University Libraries will need additional archivists and storage resources to employ state-of-the-art curatorial and archival practices for the processing, description, cataloging, selective digitization, and overall preservation of the collection.

Our goal is ambitious, but for good reason: we strongly believe that this collection is an outstanding component of our nation's cultural history. It chronicles the vision that made the Appalachian Trail a reality, a story that will serve as a catalyst and guide for future generations. We are up for the challenge.

Our archivists' skills make collections come alive.


- The University Libraries are poised to give scholars access to an extensive collection of Gilbert and Sullivan papers, theatrical documentation, and related objects, representing the duo's unique talents and reflecting the interests and sensibilities of their Victorian audiences.
- The Mason Artists' Book Collection houses and preserves artworks where the works depict new or dynamic approaches to the book form, incorporating a variety of printmaking, typography, and binding approaches. These artists' books are a vital resource for students and researchers seeking knowledge and inspiration for their own creations or the study of artistic expression and book arts. Summer camps and classes regularly visit the collection to touch, examine, question, and explore these repositories of creativity and art.

Through these and the many other unique resources held by the libraries, George Mason has become a destination for researchers from Virginia and around the world.


# **DEEPENING NARRATIVES**

The Center for Mason Legacies (CML) is an interdisciplinary, collaborative research center established by the University Libraries and the College of Humanities and Social Sciences. Its mission is to preserve and examine the legacy of George Mason, his ancestors and heirs, and the people he enslaved. CML engages student researchers in the study of past and present influences of our university's namesake in a process that combines scholarly research, public history, teaching innovation, and community outreach.

In 2021, CML launched **Black Lives Next Door**, an interdisciplinary project that re-examines the early years of George Mason College and its successor institution, George Mason University. This project advanced multiple years of faculty-student research and creative work, resulting in the **Enslaved People** of George Mason Memorial, located on five acres in the center of the main Fairfax Campus. Black Lives Next Door has fostered impactful community partnerships, among them an oral history project with local churchgoers about Black communities in Northern Virginia during the 1950s and 1960s.

The project has expanded from Fairfax County to Loudoun, Arlington, and Prince William counties, with the goal of connecting community history initiatives with ongoing university research. In 2023, Fairfax County sponsored CML graduate student research on the complex racial histories of Northern Virginia.

The work of the Center for Mason Legacies supports a core mission of the University Libraries: an honest exploration of the past to understand the present and enhance the future.

# HARNESSING ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

Recent advances in artificial intelligence have caused an upheaval in considering how information is created and what we can gain from previously unseen patterns in knowledge. To support a deeper understanding of these technologies, University Libraries formed the **Artificial Intelligence Tools**Task Force to create a plan for implementing education, training, and patron services regarding AI tools.

The libraries serve as the center of campus discussion about shared topics of scholarly interest and the most pressing intellectual and ethical matters of our time. We are at the heart of scholarly discourse and what it means to use current and future resources in a way that furthers human well-being and learning.

# **EXPANDING** ACCESS

George Mason's commitment to access and inclusion is boldly stated in the first core belief of the university's strategic plan: "We believe in inclusivity over exclusivity." So, it's no surprise that University Libraries is a leader in implementing **Open Access**, which allows students, faculty, researchers, and the community to access research freely—and free of charge—from anywhere in the world.


Giving our faculty and students no-cost publishing through Open Access ensures our vital work is right where it belongs—leading the world and available to all. The University Libraries have funded hundreds of George Mason University-authored Open Access articles, equating to hundreds of thousands of dollars in publishing support. The dissemination of this scholarly research is essential to a thriving research institution, especially one that is committed to access and equity.



# **VISUALIZING DATA**

Our **Data and Digital Scholarship Services (DDSS)** provide support in the dynamic areas of data analysis, management, and visualization. This collaborative, interdisciplinary area offers space, infrastructure, and expertise to students and faculty who are moving digital projects from idea to publication.

One example of DDSS's impactful collaborations is its partnership with the **Mason Living Labs Initiative**, which supports students, faculty, and staff to gather data and propose novel solutions to a range of sustainability challenges associated with George Mason's nearly 1,000 acres of land, waterways, forests, and buildings. As the scholarly communications ecosystem changes and there is an increased emphasis on data management and visualization, this is one of the most significant areas of opportunity for the libraries to expand resources and services to keep pace with modern scholarship.

# **MEETING NEEDS**

As the way we access and share knowledge changes, our libraries' physical spaces must also change. **Fenwick Library**, George Mason's Fairfax Campus library, was renovated and expanded in 2016 to continue meeting the needs of new and future generations of learners and scholars. That means providing spaces for quiet, individual study and robust, interactive group work. It means recognizing and supporting the needs of a richly diverse population, including first-generation students, working adults, and students with children. It means an ongoing commitment to keep pace with emerging technologies.

Highlights of the Fenwick Library renovation include:

- The Fenwick Gallery, an exhibition space dedicated to presenting works by students, faculty, staff, and emerging and established artists that highlight aspects of the libraries' collections.
- Designated spaces for individual study and group work, currently booked 99 percent of the time.
   These spaces are especially important for undergraduate commuter students, Fenwick's largest in-person student population.
- A Mamava lactation pod, made possible by donor generosity, which provides nursing mothers a secure, clean space to feed their children.

**Mason Square and Mercer Libraries** serve patrons as varied and dynamic as the region itself. Both libraries have recently undergone refreshes to better serve students. With large construction projects on both campuses likely to increase library usage, teams are already planning how to engage with and welcome future growth.

With donor support, we will continue to adapt our spaces to keep pace with an ever-evolving learning environment.





# **ENVISIONING** WHAT'S NEXT

This is our dream: A **Visual and Performing Arts Library**, designed to accommodate dynamic research and events for students, faculty, librarians, and professionals. A venue to showcase and creatively collaborate around the university's extensive visual and performing arts resources.

Here's some of what that dream looks like:

- Special-format resources, including music, media, scripts, scores, zines, artist books, and folios, centralized and artfully displayed to promote ease of discovery and inspire interdisciplinary utilization.
- Studio, rehearsal, and listening/viewing rooms where students can interact with on-site resources without the physical and sound constraints of a traditional library setting—where "Belting Voices Welcomed" replaces "Quiet Please."
- Flexible event space to bring our collection of resources to life via performance showcases, workshops, lectures, film screenings, galleries, and exhibitions.

With commitment and support, this dream can become a reality.
