
The Schar School addresses these challenges in an inclusive, multidisciplinary, nonpartisan environment to meet the needs of a rapidly changing world.

#### A GLOBAL PERSPECTIVE

The International Relations Policy Task Force (IRTF) is a year-long program in which students complete sophisticated research projects. Under the close supervision of the faculty director, students explore, learn, and overcome obstacles together. To facilitate their research, they engage with experts and policymakers, both in the D.C. region and beyond.

The specialized focus includes case studies drawn from current international conflicts, with optional spring study abroad programs. For example, students have explored the challenges and opportunities of trade, trafficking, and immigration while immersing themselves in the unique culture of the border cities of El Paso, Texas, and Ciudad Juarez, Mexico.

# HOW CAN WE STRENGTHEN ALLIANCES AMONG ALLIES AND UNDERSTANDING AMONG ADVERSARIES?

We focus on international security at the Schar School.

In this century, our security depends on more than military might and the balance of power. Climate change, pandemics, disinformation campaigns, food insecurity—these factors and more will confront future generations of intelligence experts. Investments in educating future leaders today will yield greater global stability tomorrow.



#### **INNOVATING THE CURRICULUM**

The BA in International Security and Law, a first-of-its-kind program launched in 2023, prepares graduates to be leaders when it matters most: in the face of crisis. Course content combines national and international security and law to help students understand how to most effectively respond to a wide range of threats—from weather disasters to cyber attacks to nuclear proliferation and more. Available through online and in-person formats, the program answers the call to expand and diversify our diplomatic and national security workforce.



#### A NEW INSTITUTE FOR A CRITICAL REGION

Few regions are of more interest to U.S. political, policy, business, and nonprofit leaders than the Indo-Pacific, with 60 percent of the world's population, 40 percent of global gross domestic product, 30 percent of trade, and 35 percent of foreign direct investment. Unfortunately, some of the world's most intractable security challenges are also found in the region, driven by the U.S./Chinese competition, the status of Taiwan, and access to the South China Sea.

The Schar School is ideally positioned to produce research and to prepare students to work in this crucial part of the world. **The Schar Indo-Pacific Security Institute** will build on George Mason's status as a rising star in international security studies. The Institute will design national security simulations and war games, send teams of students and military officers to the Indo-Pacific to assess future conflict scenarios, and collaborate with a leading national security think tank to produce high-impact policy recommendations and conduct multi-year studies on the consequences of U.S.-China economic competition and decoupling.



#### **STIMULATING DIALOGUE**

The Michael V. Hayden Center for Intelligence, Policy, and International Security explores the vital role that intelligence plays at a time of seemingly constant threats to our global security. Established by General (USAF-Retired) Michael V. Hayden, the only person to serve as both director of the Central Intelligence Agency and the National Security Agency, the center presents 10–15 public events annually with panels of experts from the intelligence, security, and legal communities.

The events, each of which attracts over 500 people, cover issues ranging from the essential role that espionage plays in providing stability abroad to the challenges of intelligence oversight in an age of increasing calls for government transparency. Many of the audience members are themselves either national security experts, opinion leaders, or journalists whose reputations and credentials match those of the experts on stage. The center exemplifies the Schar School's recognized role as a national leader in training the next generation of policymakers and advancing the public dialogue around issues of critical national importance.



## HOW DO WE BUILD AN ECONOMY THAT **WORKS FOR EVERYONE?**

We focus on the regional economy at the Schar School.

The impact of remote work on downtown areas. The need for private investment to help solve public problems. Meeting workforce needs, lessening income disparities, and developing alternative energy infrastructures. We collaborate across industries to address these issues today and educate students to meet the challenges of tomorrow.

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#### **STRENGTH** IN NUMBERS

The Center for Regional Analysis (CRA) tracks and interprets cutting-edge regional economic data and provides policy recommendations to address current and future challenges. CRA is the Washington, D.C. area's go-to source for data on wages and employment; consumer spending and confidence; building permits and manufacturing output; and travel patterns. The data provide a launching point for the center to promote economic growth and competitiveness across the region. Policymakers, business leaders, journalists, and academics rely on CRA's analyses to understand the challenges facing the region and to imagine what the future could look like. CRA also strategizes with broad coalitions on how to realize collective ambitions for the region in the coming decades.







#### **DRIVING INFRASTRUCTURE POLICY**

The Center for Infrastructure Public-Private Partnership Policy unites policymakers, industry leaders, and global researchers to explore innovative approaches to delivering new and renewed infrastructure facilities. Public-private partnerships (P3s or PPPs) can supplement and leverage public funding and deliver significant improvements and public benefits through efficiency, innovation, and access to private capital markets. The center's research, education programs, and outreach support objective considerations of P3s and other alternative approaches to infrastructure delivery.

#### **SERVING** THOSE WHO SERVE

The Schar School values learning cohorts because the students in these programs push and inspire one another while they are in school, and then, become lifelong thought-partners and collaborators. The 300 regional leaders who have earned MPA degrees as part of the Northern Virginia Public Service Fellows program can testify to the power of learning as part of a team. As much as Schar School faculty mentor and impact our students, we also need to get out of the way and allow them to learn from one another. Sometimes being a facilitator is more than enough!

"The bonds that students forge during our program last their entire careers. They support, encourage, and challenge each other to get better while in our classroom, and then they have a regional network supporting them years after graduation. I tell them they are only an email or call away from someone facing the same issue in another jurisdiction, and to use that resource to make the DMV a great place to live for all of us."

#### AI AND SECURITY

Professor J.P. Singh and a team of researchers from across George Mason were awarded a three-year, \$1.39 million grant from the Department of Defense's esteemed **Minerva Research Initiative**, a joint program of the Office of Basic Research and the Office of Policy that supports research on expanding basic understanding of security and artificial intelligence.

Working with George Mason computer scientists, philosophers, and national security experts, the team is mapping the cultural context in which AI is used around the world. This predictive information will enable military strategists to better understand emerging technologies and their interactions with modern warfare. By understanding what an ally or adversary will and will not do with a particular technology, national security practitioners can develop strategies to respond to future crises.

"Rather than resign ourselves to the ominous scenarios about technology published every day in media reports, our research identifies policy spaces where smart regulatory and policy interventions can make a positive difference. We believe this is important in educating both the policymakers and the workforce of tomorrow."






## TOMORROW'S DEGREES TODAY

In fall 2023, the Schar School and George Mason's School of Computing launched the **BS** in Applied Computer Science, Technology Policy Concentration, an innovative degree at the intersection of technology and policy. The curriculum explores the possibilities and challenges inherent in new technologies and the ways public institutions can seek to regulate these technologies to maximize their benefits. Graduates will have all of the knowledge and skills of a traditional computer science major, as well as an understanding of the regulatory landscape, policy implications, and ethical decisions that govern their profession. The program will be offered at **Fuse at Mason Square**, George Mason's newest building and the centerpiece of the Arlington campus.

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#### TACKLING THE BIG QUESTIONS

#### Why do we have the world that we have? How did we get here?

#### What are the origins of human cultures?

Hazel Professor of Policy Professor Jack Goldstone approaches these questions through the perspective of population change. Ever since the 2010 publication of his provocative article "The New Population Bomb: The Four Megatrends That Will Change the World" in *Foreign Affairs*, Goldstone has been a leading authority on the impact that overpopulation and changing demographics have—and will have—on society. Goldstone's research, which examines current global trends and long-term changes, provides policymakers with data-based findings to inform decision-making in areas ranging from immigration and economic development to political stability and international terrorism.

#### MINDING THE GAP

**The Gender and Policy (GAP) Center** addresses the underrepresentation of women in positions of influence and power in the public sphere and identifies policy inequities for women and other underrepresented groups by preparing the next generation of leaders in policy-making, politics, and the private sector.

By combining teaching, experiential learning, and scholarship about today's most challenging gender and policy issues, the GAP Center prepares Schar School students to become empathetic, problem-solving leaders. Tackling topics in three primary areas—politics and public authority, women's health and wellbeing, and gender-based violence—GAP Center faculty and students collaborate as researchers and benefit from the expertise of an advisory board of professionals from the public and private sectors.

GAP was selected by the Center for American Women and Politics as Virginia's sole NEW Leadership® National Network Partner.
